1. What I should already know:

- What an adjective, verb, noun and adverb is.
- What alliteration is and how to use it effectively.

2. What I am going to learn:

4. Important vocabulary and facts:

Adjective – a word that describes a noun (i.e., red car, fluffy jumper)

Verbs – a word that describes an action (i.e., running, to yawn, sleeping)

Figurative Language – language that doesn't mean exactly what it says, but helps to bring your writing to life and get your message across

Simile – a comparison that uses the words 'like' or 'as' (i.e., as fast as lightning)

Metaphor – a bit like a simile, but this time you compare the two objects by saying one 'is' or 'was' the other (i.e., the sun is a gleaming pearl)

Alliteration – the same SOUND at the BEGINNING of words, (i.e., Fred's phone fell).

Personification – giving non-human objects human qualities (i.e., the door screamed)
