# Self-Discipline Is self-discipline important in life?

### **Our Biq Question**

#### Key Knowledge

- Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and lasts for 40 days.
- On Ash Wednesday, a cross is made on our heads with ashes. The priest may say, "Repent, and believe in the Gospel." The ashes symbolise penance and contrition, and remind us that God is merciful to those who call on Him.
- Lent is a time to practice self-discipline and become more like Jesus (through prayer, fasting and almsgiving).
- Jesus' told us to love our enemies and expect nothing back when we do good - this is living in God's way.
- In Holy Week, we remember the suffering, death and Resurrection of Jesus and hear the story of this (the Passion). Holy week begins on Palm Sunday and ends on Holy
- The Easter Triduum is the three days before Easter Sunday, starting on Maundy Thursday and ending with the Easter Vigil on **Holy Saturday**. This marks the most significant events of Holy Week.
- On Maundy Thursday, we are reminded how Jesus showed his self-giving when he washed the disciples' feet.
- During Lent, many people will pray the **Stations** of the Cross.
- On Good Friday, we remember Jesus' suffering and death. We believe that Jesus gave his life for us because he loved us so much.

Key Vocabulary and Definitions	
almsgiving	Doing good for others (e.g. giving food or money to the poor)
contrition	Repenting past sins. Being Sorry.
Easter	The celebration of Jesus' Resurrection from the dead.
fasting	To go without something. Usually giving up food.
Lent	The time Christians prepare for Easter. It lasts for 40 days.
penance	Confession of sins. Outward expression of being sorry.
Resurrection	The belief in Jesus rising from the dead.

#### Prior Knowledge and Skills

- Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and lasts for 40 days and purple is used to symbolise repentance.
- On **Ash Wednesday**, a cross is made on our heads with ashes. The priest may say, "Remember you are dust, and to dust you shall return."
- **Lent** is a time to grow in goodness (**prayer**, **fasting** and **almsgiving**).
- In Holy Week, we remember the suffering, death and Resurrection of Jesus and hear the story of this (the Passion).
- Palm Sunday is the beginning of Holy Week. The priest wears red as a sign of someone who has died for what they believe.
- On Palm Sunday we remember Jesus riding into Jerusalem on a donkey. The people waved palms and shouted, "Hosanna!" The Passion is read on Palm Sunday.
- On Maundy Thursday, the priest washes feet to remind us how Jesus showed us to serve others. I have retald the story of the Last Supper.
- $\boldsymbol{Good}$   $\boldsymbol{Friday}$  is a day we remember that Jesus died on the  $\boldsymbol{cross}$ because he loved us so much. The Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary tell the story of Jesus' total self-giving.
- On Easter Sunday we celebrate the Resurrection. We sing 'alleluia' on Easter Sunday because everyone is so happy.
