
Lesson Feedback

Live marking – This is how we'll be giving your children feedback. Teachers and TAs work their way
around the room to 'live' mark children's independent work. This avoids children embedding errors and
means they can fix errors in the moment with guided support.

There are no statutory assessments in Year 5, but we do have termly NFER tests which provide us with standardised scores for the children in reading, maths and grammar. Writing is assessed via teacher and comparable judgement and our foundation subjects are again assessed via teacher judgement against list of criterion (objectives). YARC tests (York Assessment of Reading Comprehension) are undertaken for all in Pentecost term, and for those below their reading age in the Advent term also.

Uniform and PE Kit - Smart and ready to learn

Saint Elizabeth's was founded by the nuns of the Franciscan order in 1936. Our uniform is gold and brown to reflect the colour of the clothes worn by Saint Francis. Our uniform identifies us to the wider community, while wearing it instils a sense of belonging and equality amongst the children.

Boys' winter uniform: white shirt, brown pullover, black trousers (not cargo style), brown/gold tie, black or brown socks, black or brown socks, black or brown coat.

Boys' summer uniform: white polo shirt with school logo, black trousers (not cargo style) **OR** brown or black shorts, brown pullover, black or brown socks, black or brown sandals or shoes.

Girls' winter uniform: white shirt, brown pinafore **OR** brown skirt (knee length) **OR** black trousers (not cargo style), brown/gold tie, brown cardigan or pullover, white or black socks or brown tights, black shoes, black or brown coat. **Girls' summer uniform:** gold checked dress/playsuit, brown pullover or cardigan, white socks, black or brown sandals or shoes.

Brown fleeces or brown blazers, with school logo, may be worn for outdoor wear throughout the year (boys and girls).

Please ensure that all items of uniform are **permanently labelled** with your child's name. This ensures that we can get items back to their rightful owner if they go astray. We cannot guarantee an items return if it is not labelled.


PE is an important part of the curriculum and, on the days they have PE, children need to come to school in their PE kit. Our PE kit consists of unbranded black joggers (or plain black shorts in summer), a yellow polo shirt, yellow (un)branded sweatshirt and plimsolls or sensible trainers. Where possible, long hair should be tied up and earrings removed **prior** to coming to school. If needed, earring tape must be provided from home.

Our P.E lessons are **Tuesday** and **Friday** for the this half term.

Year 5 Reading Expectations

- We encourage at least 10 minutes reading everyday the more the better! This could be reading to an adult or sibling, or reading independently.
- Children should be recording unfamiliar words onto their bookmark throughout their reading session. Adults are encouraged to record words on these too!
- All KS2 children will have a home reading book and a school reading book. It is the children's responsibility to 'blog' their home reading book on MyBookBlog at home, and to bring it into school on their set day.
- Fostering a love of reading also means that we should be reading to the children regularly too. Audiobooks and Youtube 'read throughs' are another great way to hook more reluctant readers! Help to develop a love of reading through exposure to a variety of books, comics, graphic novels, recipes etc.

Spelling

We are continuing our new KS2 spelling scheme – Read, Write, Inc. Spelling. This continues from our KS1 phonics scheme to allow for cohesive and consistent progression and development.

We now have set spelling sessions each week, running for 15 minutes 3x per week (Tuesday, Wednesday & Thursday).

Assessment throughout a unit is ongoing and children will be logging spellings that they find difficult in their 'Spelling Logs'. These words will be personalised to each child, as the children choose the words they wish to 'log', based on which words they have found difficult throughout the week. These words are then tested in partners (in a low-stakes manner) at the start of the following unit. You can help support your child by practising the words in your child's spelling log each night at home, and by revisiting words learnt in previous weeks.



Mathematics

Throughout the school we follow the Power Maths scheme which is a UK curriculum mastery programme.

The lessons are broken down into different section; Discover – pair working to answer a mathematical question based in a relatable situation; Share – whole class teacher lead where we look at how the answer can be achieved; Think Together – I do, We do, You do. We work out the questions together using different approaches with independent practice (the work in their books).

We support children's learning through concrete, pictorial and abstract, to ensure that the children develop a deeper understanding of what they are learning. The children then build on these approaches, developing and embedding skills over time, which can then be used to reason and solve problems. We use mistakes and misconceptions as an essential part of learning and provide challenge through rich sophisticated problems.

End of unit tests help us to track progress and develop and challenge where appropriate, and every classroom has an appropriate Maths Working Wall. Working walls are interactive displays that are designed to reinforce and consolidate children's knowledge and understanding through practical applications in order to aid children in their learning.


Each week, Year 5 children also undertake an arithmetic test. We mark correct answers together and, as weekly homework, the test is then sent home for children to fix incorrect answers. This is sent home each Friday, due for return the following Friday.

Homework

As the children enter Upper Key Stage 2, we promote responsibility for learning through weekly homework. Homework is set every Friday, due to be returned the following Friday.

Homework will be sent home (and is to be returned) in their personalised homework journal. If the children do not complete or return their homework, I will provide time (outside of lessons) for them to complete the work with me. They are more than welcome to ask you for support with their homework if needed, but if substantial support was needed, please make a note of this on the sheet so that I am aware of this upon return.

Alternatively, overarching homework projects may be set. These will span over a few weeks/a half term and details of each project will be sent home in plenty of time.



English

Spelling: We are comtinuing with Read, Write, Inc spellings this year, with three fifters minute spelling lessons per week. Assessment throughout a unit is engoing, and each week children will be 6 works that they have found difficult in their Spelling logs. It is important to note that these works are personalised to each child, and therefore there is no "set spelling list each week. Due to the 3-day cgice of the scheme, the day of the week that these words will be recorded will changs. Writing: In our Talk 4 Writing lessons this term, we will be orating our owns setting description, followed by our own portry books. To add depth to rur setting descriptions, we will be learning how to ringern the handle of three using personification, learning how to reflect the mood using pathetic fallace and building upon our 'hown, not ell' skills (for example, 'tears brimmed over his lashes', rather than 'he started to ory).

Grammatically, we will be learning how to effectively integrate relative clauses, brackets, semi-colons and building upon our use of fronted adverbials and expanded noun phrases.

Reading: Firstly, thank you for your continued support with the children's reading across the years – it is greatly appreciated! In Year 5, children are expected to read a home for a minimum of 10-15 minutes a day every day – the more the better!
