

Advent 1 - 2023

The Crocodile by Lewis Carroll


How doth the little crocodile Improve his shining tail, And pour the waters of the Nile On every golden scale!

Forming an opinion or conclusion, based on the evidence you are given.

Reading in EYFS and KS1

Read Write Inc.

We teach our Phonics using the popular Ruth Miskin **Read**, **Write**, **Inc**. (RWI) scheme. Like all phonics schemes, it teaches children the sounds in English, the letters that represent them, and how to form the letters when writing. Through RWI, the children will quickly feel confident and successful in their phonetic ability. RWI includes reading books written using only the letters and sounds that they have learnt at each level, and a small number of separately taught **tricky words**. These are words that don't appear to fit with the phonemes that represent them, such as **he**, **said** and **the**. These words are taught as whole words, rather than as a combination of sounds.

EYFS will be focusing on **Set 1** sounds this term. **Set 1** sounds are: **m a s d t i n p g o c k u b f e l h r j v y w z x sh th ch qu ng nk ck**

When saying these sounds at home, it is important to use <u>pure sounds.</u> Watch the video attached to see these sounds in action.

Year 1 will be focusing on revisiting **Set 2**, then moving on to **Set 3** sounds this term. **Set 2** sounds are:

ay ee igh ow (as in blow) oo (as in zoo) oo (as in look) ar or air ir ou (as in out) oy

Year 2 will be focusing on **Set 3** sounds this term. **Set 3** sounds are:

ea (as in tea)
i-e (as in smile)
u-e (as in huge)
ur (as in nurse)
ai (as in snail)
ire (as in fire)

oi (as in soil) o-e (as in bone) aw (as in yawn) er (as in letter) oa (as in goat) ear (as in hear) **unds are: a-e** (as in cake) **u-e** (as in home) **are** (as in care) **ow** (as in brown) **ew** (as in chew) **ure** (as in pure)
